From our Pastor...

Did you know that up to 40% of young clergy leave congregational ministry in their first five years? This is a staggering statistic but sadly, due to factors like loneliness, isolation, conflict, debt, and burnout, it is true. That's why I have been so grateful that Pomona Fellowship Church of the Brethren supports my participation in Bethany Fellows, a mentoring and spiritual leadership fellowship for young clergy in their first four years of congregational service.

Bethany Fellows is a program that is funded and run by the Disciples of Christ denomination (not Bethany Theological Seminary—I know, it's initially confusing! I suppose Christians really like to use some of the same biblical names). Originally started 20 years ago for DoC ministers, the program has now expanded to include an ecumenical group as well, which is the program into which I have been welcomed. (I am the only Church of the Brethren Bethany Fellow... at least for now!)

Participants in Bethany Fellows attend a series of retreats, strategically scheduled every 6 months, for a total of 8 retreats over 4 years (40 days total!). Each retreat experience contains worship, prayer, a day of silence and sabbath, small groups and time with mentors, and educational sessions tailored to the emerging needs of our congregations.

I have been so nourished by my participation in two retreats so far, my first back in April in St. Louis and my second just this past September outside of Minneapolis. My experience has been so enriching, both for my ministry with PFCoB and for my own identity as a pastor. During the retreats I am able to worship (without needing to preach and/or lead those services!), pray with others AND be prayed for, make connections with young clergy across the country who are serving as associate pastors, senior pastors, solo pastors, and church planters, and simply have time for sabbath and rest.

PFCoB graciously contributes \$2500 a year for my participation in Bethany Fellows, and supports my taking 10 professional growth days each year to attend the retreats. But this funding is not just benefiting me as your pastor; it's also benefiting this congregation as a whole. Because the mission of Bethany Fellows is this: Bethany Fellows serves congregations by assisting newly ordained pastors in their transition from seminary to sustained congregational ministry with a strengthened, healthy pastoral identity. Did you catch who this program serves? It serves YOU: Pomona Fellowship Church of the Brethren. Because only healthy and supported pastors can lead healthy and vibrant congregations.

I am deeply grateful for your support of this life-giving fellowship.

Fun Facts from the Pages of Our History

In 1956, the Pomona congregation worked with the Brethren Service Commission to arrange the repatriation of 6 Dutch-Indonesian persons. After Indonesians gained independence from Holland, any persons with more than 50% Dutch blood were to be sent back to Holland, except that Holland didn't want these people to return. Many moved to the United States looking for a new home, and members of the Pomona congregation helped some of these folks find jobs and also housed them temporarily.

News from the Church at Large

Bethany Seminary Welcomes New International Scholar in Residence

Dr. Nyampa Kwabe of Plateau State, Nigeria, is serving as international scholar in residence at Bethany Theological Seminary during the fall 2019 semester. An Old Testament scholar, he is currently acting head of the Department of Biblical Studies at the Theological College of Northern Nigeria (TCNN). He will be a resident of the Bethany Neighborhood, adjacent to campus, until his departure in mid-December.

Prior to arriving, Kwabe cotaught Bethany's August intensive course, Gospel of Peace, from Nigeria as Dan Ulrich, Weiand Professor of New Testament Studies, taught from Bethany. It was the first course for the new cohort of Nigerian students in the Seminary's partnership with Ekklesiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN). North American students joined the EYN students in taking the course via synchronous video.

While at Bethany, Kwabe anticipates attending classes and working on articles that explore a particular method of interpreting scripture: "a hermeneutics for transformative biblical interpretation that will bridge the gaps between academia and the church and between exegesis and spirituality. I thank God and Bethany Theological Seminary for the opportunity to pursue this interest." Hermeneutics was an area of concentration in Kwabe's MATh from International Christian College in Glasgow, Scotland (2004), and his PhD from the University of Leeds, England (2015). He also holds an MATh (2001) and a BD (1994) from TCNN.

A member of EYN, Kwabe served as a church leader in Jalingo, Taraba State, in 1994, then was transferred to teach at Kulp Bible College (now Kulp Theological Seminary) in 1995. He began teaching at TCNN as a graduate student in 1998. Ordained by EYN in 2000, Kwabe fulfills preaching and teaching engagements and serves on the EYN Pastors Advisory Council. He also runs Nyampa-

Frontline Rescue Ministry, a nondenominational organization that promotes the gospel message and supports holistic church growth through biblical interpretation, preaching, discipleship, and charity. The ministry primarily serves EYN and other Christian churches in northeastern Nigeria, a region heavily affected by Boko Haram.

The District Conference Program Committee has selected Refugee Aid as our service project this year. Refugee Aid is an organization started in Phoenix and is supported by the Papago Buttes congregation in Scottsdale, Arizona. Specifically **our offering will collect:**


- New socks and underwear for children and adults (small and medium sizes only, please)
- Gently used clothing for children and small adults is also appreciated
- Monetary donations can also be made with checks to PSWD and the funds will be passed along.

Refugee Aid is a volunteer group of concerned individuals who assist refugee families seeking asylum in the United States. "We are disturbed by the

mistreatment of refugee families, particularly refugee children. We believe all people deserve to be treated humanely. The refugee families we serve have permission from our federal Government to remain in the U.S. with their sponsors while their asylum case is pending. Their sponsors provide them with air or bus tickets to cities across the U.S. Many families will travel for days with little or no food or money, and would travel in the clothing they have worn for weeks or months without some local intervention.

Refugee Aid supports a network of churches, mostly small, Spanish-speaking congregations with few resources. There are a growing number of churches involved in this effort, but the network we support is now coordinated through Lutheran Social Services of the Southwest (LSS-SW), the main refugee resettlement organization in the Phoenix valley. There are no local or state government funds available in Arizona to assist in providing for these families.

Refugee Aid volunteers help serve about 1500 persons each week, providing hot food, a shower when available, a change of clothing, a place to sleep for the night, some travel food and a few dollars, a ride to their plane or bus, and a large helping of God's love and comfort. Refugee Aid volunteers are organized into teams, each team to address one of the diverse needs of the families.
